

# Spooky (not scary!) Halloween Mystery Narrative

Using what you have learned in class about the characteristics of mystery narratives, write a spooky Halloween mystery.

Your spooky Halloween mystery should include the following:

1. An interesting title page that relates to the story.
2. Your narrative must be written neatly by hand, or typed on computer. It should be written in the first or third person perspective. It should also include the following important elements of a short story:
  - Setting
  - Characters (sleuth, victim, suspects)
  - Plot
  - Problem - what happened?
  - Clues
  - Climax
  - Resolution



3. Your narrative should be *approximately 2 pages*.

This assignment will be graded according to three components:

- a) **Written component** - Does your story contain all of the important characteristics of a narrative? Did you write the story using first or third person perspective? Does the story make sense? Is it interesting? Does it make sense grammatically? Are there many spelling errors? Did you include a well-written autobiography about yourself the author? Does your story make use of some of the spooky Halloween vocabulary words?
- b) **Artistic component** - Your title page will be graded according to how much effort and detail placed in your work. Does your title page generate interest in your story? Does it make the reader want to read? Is it related to your story? Does it give the reader hints as to what your story will be about?
- c) **Reading/oral component** - Did you participate in the story sharing aspect of this assignment?

# Spooky Mystery Graphic Organizer

## Setting

(time of year, time of day, temperature) What does it look like? Sound like? Smell like? What other descriptive information can you provide?

Physical characteristics, other characteristics. Be detailed!

## Main Characters

Usually these are your detectives.

## Supporting Characters

Anyone else in the story who isn't a main character.

## Suspects

People that you think may be guilty of the crime. Only one is the true criminal!

**Problem** - the mystery (what was the crime?) Be detailed!

**Clues** - describe at least 3 clues left behind.

**Solution** - How was the mystery solved?

## Success Criteria:

I can:

Use my knowledge of narrative and mystery elements to write a spooky (not scary!) Halloween mystery story.

My story will include:

- o School-appropriate language (not gory, scary, or explicit language)
- o Setting, characters, problem (mystery), clues, solution
- o Sequential events with clues
- o No dialogue (we will learn how to do this properly at a later date)
- o Proper grammar and spelling of age-appropriate words
- o Illustrations that are coloured and add to the story
- o Effort in following the writing process (prewriting, first draft, revision, editing, publishing).
- o My own work - little adult support
- o Oral component: I shared my story with my peers
